HISTORY

In the late 1970's, private sector fuel funds sprung up across the United States to address the effects of rising energy costs on low-income households.

By 1983, more than 70 fuel funds were established, and in 1984 the National Fuel Funds Network was formed.

Today, the NFFN is an organization that builds the capacity of member programs to raise and distribute about \$150 million in energy assistance annually.

NFFN's diverse membership includes more than 300 nonprofit, government and Tribal agencies; utilities, and trade associations.
